Netherby 2016 countdown to 150 year celebration

Happy belated New Year to everyone,

I have taken a break from Netherby 2016 to concentrate on my new job, which could be changing again soon! That does not mean that I have not been thinking about the Netherby for I certainly have. However, we are only a couple of weeks away from our next meeting (Feb 19) and it is time to jump back into the saddle.

So let me take you back to November 2011 and our trip to King Island to observe the 150th anniversary of the Cape Wickham Lighthouse. On arrival we had lunch with Sharon Benn. We were staying at Netherby Downs, one of 2 accommodation properties owned by Sharon and Jim Benn (advertised on these pages). Sharon was a delightful host and it was not long before we were discussing thoughts on the format for Netherby 2016. Sharon was not the only person to make a similar statement during our visit but she was the first to say that Netherby 2016 could become bigger than Ben Hur so we need to keep it manageable for King Island.

As I tabled thoughts and ideas, Sharon made notes and at the end of our lunch she handed back those notes and had listed a name alongside each idea.

Each name will become a contact for our Netherby 2016 celebrations. This by itself has given me the confidence that we can achieve our itinerary.

After lunch, Sharon loaded us with a large plastic tub of reading material on King Island Shipwrecks, all things Netherby and the Skerman family history and a boot load of fire wood and I felt that we had passed our first test! I had verbalised a plan and it seemed to have been acceptable in size, context and value to King Island. It was at this point that my motivation soared!


When we left Sharon, it was also a farewell, as the next day Sharon was leaving the island to visit her grandson in Queensland.

However, our day with the Benn's was not yet over. Sharon had arranged for us to catch up with Jim who would take us to the Netherby wreck site and hopefully point out to me roughly where the ship struck rocks.

As it turned out, Jim not only was able to point the landmarks out to me, but he dangled a carrot in my face as well, by pointing out where we might be able to see the rib bones of the ship. It was a blustery day, as we clambered over rocky terrain but the waves were not that high, and the weather not at all cold. However, once I knew where that ship had lain stricken I marvelled at it all—the people coming ashore, the lack of shelter, their fears and rescue.

Over the next few days, I visited the site daily and would not be happy until I made it to within camera shot of those rib bones. Jim, also, had heard that snorkelers over the site reported that the mast was still there as well.

This was our second visit to King Island. It was good to have our bearings and to be in town for the lead up to the Lighthouse celebrations. Ernst and I wore our Netherby 2016 polo shirts and every day had people enquire about the relevance of Netherby 2016. There have definitely been some changes and improvements since our 2008 visit. The shipwreck trail has signposts (pictured left) providing information about the site.

In our movements around the island I dropped off a few brochures promoting the reprint of Don Charlwood's book. The interest was small due to the focus on the Cape Wickham Lighthouse celebrations.

At the newsagency, we were able to purchase the local newspaper which had a cut out of the lighthouse for children to assemble. What a great idea! They also had free copies of a wonderful, glossy publication on the history of the Wickham Lighthouse. We were to find these in a couple of places around town and encouraged by the businesses to take a copy. I will bring these to our next meeting.

A number of stores had set up a display in either their window or inside. These were historical displays with photos, period items and even some items borrowed from the museum. It was a good idea as well, as it encouraged us to walk inside each business. There were also people in period costume.
