## countdown to 150 year celebration

### Newsletter for the descendants of the passengers & crew of the 1866 Netherby

Hello everyone,

My apologies for such a long wait.

We were saddened to hear that Don Charlwood, author of "The Wreck of the Sailing Ship Netherby", passed away just before our last meeting. Our thoughts and well wishes go to Nell, Doreen, family and friends.

Don's book was in part, the inspiration for me to take on this project and it was a huge pleasure that I had the opportunity to meet him.

The other motivator was Karina and her website netherby.homestead.com . Karina has moved to Melbourne. Welcome Karina. We must meet soon and hope to see you at the November meeting, if at all possible.

I received a briefing from Sue Fisher on King Island who brought me up to date with the launch of the Netherby Bell on July 14. She said in part that over 100 people attended on the day and that it was typical KI weather for that weekend.

They started with an 11am history talk of the Netherby ship. There were 2 readings, one by Jaiden Rainbow who is a direct descendant of William Hickmott from the Cape Wickham lighthouse. This reading was William's account of the help he provided to the survivors.

The second reading was about John Parry's direct involvement in organising the rescue of the Netherby passengers and crew.



The principal of the Swan Reach School, which is the guardian of the Netherby Bell, travelled to King Island for the official handover of the bell to the KI Historical Society.

A luncheon was held for all involved and the KI school children put on a display of all things Netherby in the tea rooms.

Sue was the official MC on the day and I thank her very much for her time and effort and that of the KI Historical Society and everyone involved.

The bell is significant to the descendants as we know it was used on land after the wrecking, to communicate

that the salvaged food/drink were safe. With 450 people all needing food/water—the management of the salvaged food stores was of extreme importance to the survival of the group. The bell was thought to have been given (at a later date) to the Roadknight family who assisted Parry when he arrived on Victorian shores within days of the wrecking.

Since our June meeting, my efforts have been mainly to find out what we need to do as a group to ensure the Netherby 2016 celebrations occur. The decision is whether we become an incorporated group which would require registration, a statement of purpose, election of members and scheduled official meetings with minutes etc. The advantage of being incorporated is that the group is covered legally and can make application for grants, permits etc without needing the approval of another body. To be unincorporated means we can continue as we are (a social group) with no need for formalised agendas, meetings, minutes etc. However, we will face difficulties being approved for grants. We also could be liable as individuals if someone had a grievance and sought legal action against the group or an individual.

There is a third option and that would be to ask an Incorporated Body to auspice our unincorp group. In this case, we would continue as we are, but report to the Incorp Group and have them manage the grant applications/ licensing/permits. In my opinion, I think this is the way for us to go. The only issue being who will sponsor us??

I have thought of King Island Council or Chamber of Commerce. It makes sense! However, I am not on King Island and am unsure how much to/fro would be required. Any suggestions?? Please contact me straight away. Perhaps you belong to a society or group who would auspice us??

### Your feedback and support is paramount to the success of Netherby 2016.

Initial thoughts are that Netherby 2016 will be a **4—5 day celebration**.

The 150th anniversary will occur just after 7pm on **Thursday evening** beachside with a light supper afterwards.

**Friday** would be a free day to explore and hopefully for KI to show off some of it's produces/wares and features.

**Friday night**—potentially the Netherby 2016 Ball

**Saturday**—a big day, with much happening (something for everyone?).

A football game (item 4.1), golf competition or social game, potentially lawn balls if enough interest? An Orienteering race/challenge (item 4.11)

**Saturday evening**—free (suspect there may be a big gathering of Skerman families) **Sunday morning**—speeches/service again beachside followed by a presentation by the descendants of the Netherby passengers/crew to King Island of trees/plants which will revegetate an area near the Netherby shipwreck site (to be confirmed).

Guiness Book of Records attempt (largest number of descendants gathered for a ship-wreck celebration) Item 4.13.

**Luncheon (similar to the Long Table)** (item 4.12). **End of event.** 

Running in the background throughout the event:

- 4.2 **Market stalls**—seasonal produce, art, craft, static displays showcasing KI.
- 4.7 **Crayfish** (will they be in season?) Tours of harbour area, crayboats, tastings, sales etc
- 4.8 **Shop window dressings**. Period costumes. Street flags/colour. Something at the airport to welcome our Netherby descendants and something on the round about in Currie central
- 4.4 **Model boats**. A single effort was made by myself a long time ago to get some boat modelling clubs on-board to set up displays. There was no enthusi asm from the Vic group. A couple of people (in our Netherby group) are inter ested in building a model of the Netherby. This too is proving a difficult task as there are no known pictures of her. I also thought about bigger boats such as the wooden ship festival?? Maybe we could tie in there somehow? King Island Historical Society has indicated that they are following up the idea of a model replica of the Netherby.
- 4.6 **Naval involvement** such as a sail past or rescue demonstrations. Perhaps some sort of tie in with Williamstown? A static display at the least.
- 4.11 An **orienteering race** that tracks close to the path our people would have taken from Netherby cove to the Cape Wickham lighthouse.
- 4.14 **Museum Display**. All things Netherby. Maybe artist's collections related to shipwrecks in general in a different part of the museum or elsewhere on the island. T


Tours of Cape Wickham Lighthouse?

- 4.15 **Genealogy/Ancestral display**. There are a number of annual events world wide. Maybe we could coordinate a display at the market day or at the museum/gallery.
- 4.19 **Dairy**—as per 4.7 & 4.12—it would be great for the Dairy to be involved in our celebration and an opportunity to show off their produce. Perhaps there are other businesses who need to be included/approached.
- 4.21 Two new items will be tabled. Neither is confirmed as yet. I shall hold you in suspense until I have permission to announce.

Sue Fisher, King Island Historical Society/Museum has advised that the Netherby bell in it's new housing is now on display and will remain at the museum until our event in 2016.

No visit to King Island would be complete without some quality time set aside for a wander through the museum.

Recently I ran an ebay search for "Netherby". You have to try these things!! Anyway, interestingly enough, 2 items cropped up.

Both were newspaper pages! Both were from 1905/1906 and available for purchase in the UK.

If anyone happens to have a boat and you want to christen it Netherby, you should be wary.

Our Netherby struck rocks and sank in 1866. Another Netherby was hopelessly lost with all hands on board somewhere around Cape Horn in 1905. There is a very clear photo of that Netherby and I think it may even be the same ship as the image I use on the front page of my newsletter.

Another ship, also called the Netherby, this time a steam ship was set fire to whilst underway. It was a British ship carrying coal and hired by Russia to travel a long way into Siberia.

Both newspapers are available for purchase at approx. 26 british pounds. I have declined to buy but a portion of me thinks I should have bought the one that had the photo of the 1905 Netherby. Oh well....
